IN MEMORIAM

EDITH HELEN HOTCHKINS.

Edith Helen Hotchkins, who was laid to rest on the first anniversary of her wedding day, was one of Methodism's earnest girl-workers. During many years of her early life and later maidenhood, as a devoted Christian Endeavourer and Sunday school worker, she gave much glad and acceptable service. She was the daughter of parents greatly honoured in our church at Nowra, Mr. and Mrs. W. Corfield, and was the sister of Mrs. P. J. Waterhouse, a pioneer missionary sister to New Guinea. Mrs. Hotchkins last year married Mr. William Hotchkins, a returned soldier wounded severely in the service of his country. The Rev. Harold Wheen, who performed the marriage ceremony, also conducted the funeral service, whilst Mr. F. Cull, who gave the bride away, stood as a mourner at the graveside. The Rev. Joseph Woodhouse, of Ashfield, assisted at the funeral, which took place in the beautiful Waverley cemetery.

MRS. W. CHAPMAN.

The late Mrs. W. Chapman—Mary Elizabeth Field—was born at the Cowpastures, Camden district, on 3rd September, 1840. Her mother died while she was young, and she lived with her grandmother for some time. Her father, the late John Field, was a local preacher, and afterwards removed to Bolwarra, on the Hunter River. As a girl, Mrs. Chapman had very little opportunity of attending school, but she dearly loved her Sunday school, which was one of the largest in New South Wales at the time, and where she received sound instruction in spiritual things. At the age of twelve she was converted in a camp meeting held on the Hunter River, and this spiritual crisis was to her a season of refreshing from the presence of the Lord, the gracious influence of which remained with her throughout her long life. After some happy years on the Hunter she removed with her parents to the Manning River, settling at Oxley Island, which was then all wild bush. Later she married William Chapman, and reared a family of six sons and three daughters, and by example and precept trained them up in the way of godliness. Though she had many hardships and discouragements, as one of the early pioneers of the Manning, she was a devoted wife and loving mother, and above all, a true child of God, enduring to the end as "seeing Him Who is invisible." A staunch member of the Methodist Church, she was always ready to give of her best to help on the work and taught her children to do the same. At one time she told her class leader on Jones' Island that she would have to leave off attending his class, and when he asked her the reason, she told him she could not pay for her class ticket, but he told her to attend, even if she could not pay. In her old age she reversed this order; and when she was unable through feebleness to attend church, she still contributed generously to its support, and gave also regularly to other deserving causes. She was always a cheerful optimist, looking on the bright side of things, and believing

that all things were for the best. In times of sickness and suffering she would say, "Father knows all about it." She loved to talk of the better world and the larger life, and now she rests from her labours, and her works do follow her.

Christmas Day was a gala day at the War Memorial Hospital. The entire building was beautifully decorated with balloons, coloured streamers, holly and Christmas bush.
